# AVIATION GROUND SCHOOL PLANNED FOR FRIDAY BY HATFIEI

Those interested in aviation are invited to attend a meeting to be held on Friday evening of this week at 7 o'clock, dst., at the Stahly field, 1 mile north of Nappanee when Milton Hatfield, in charge of the Mishawaka Aviation field will be present and will conduct a ground school on the technical side of flying, using a Taylor Cub plane for this purpose. He will explain a plan whereby an aviation club can be formed here in Nap-panee at a small cost to each member and has promised to take some of those in attendance at the meeting for a short ride in the air.

It is not as expensive as some believe to belong to such a club and in Mishawaka it costs a member \$20 initiation fee, \$10 a month for dues, the latter amount paying for two hours of actual flying and the former including the cost of instruction. Additional flying costs average about \$4.00 per hour and with a club of ten members for instance a plane can be purchased and with the naming of one of the number to manage the affairs of the club each member can fly without inconvenience to others if proper consideration is given to the desire of each for time of flying.

Mr. Hatfield successfully carries

on at the Mishawaka club and is of the opinion such a club could be successfully operated here and is coming to Nappanee on Friday evening to explain the plan in detail. If enough interest is shown and a club formed he is willing to bring a plane from the Mishawaka airport to be used until such time as the local club could finance a plane of its own.

Last Saturday Mr. Hatfield was in Nappanee with his plane and he and Forrest Postma did some flying in the vicinity of Nappanee which attracted considerable attention. says no one will be obligated in any way by attending the meeting Friday evening and he will be only too glad to give what information he can to those interested. We have quite a number interested in flying here and he should have no trouble in attracting these to the meeting.
